



NATIONAL PRESIDENT VISITS RAPHAEL

In his first year as the National President of Ryder-Cheshire Australia, Rory McEwen, has recently returned from a visit to Raphael. Below is his report.

My visit to Raphael commenced with two one day trips, the first into the foothills of the Himalayas where our jeep driver managed to deliver four of us safely to a small school in a tiny village to meet with around 50 parents and their disabled children. The journey along narrow winding mountain roads was not for the faint hearted. Marvelling at the women struggling up steep inclines, almost buried in huge loads of vegetation balanced on their heads, took our minds off the perils of the journey.



The gathering that awaited us at the end of our four hour trek had assembled for a briefing on managing and modifying challenging behaviours and to discuss sexuality and the disabled. Our talented presenters spoke in Hindi. Luckily the accompanying slides were in English so I could get some feel for the animated discussion. Some of

the parents, particularly the men, didn't seem to take kindly to some of the frank discussions but it was an overwhelming success.

The second day was much tamer but equally enlightening. We set out on flat country to visit a number of primary schools where Raphael had gained access to some classroom space and employed staff to work with disabled children. The work was greatly appreciated by the schools, parents and children involved. Living conditions of many of these families can only be described as basic. Living with your cattle, I was told, added warmth. No mention of the other challenges involved.

Once having been exposed to the outreach educational and support programmes it was time to visit Raphael. First to the T.B. hospital to meet Dr Gupta. Wow! what a remarkable man. He and his team lessen suffering in a huge way by managing and treating T.B. patients in the two hospital wards (nearly 400 admissions last year) and the 3,000 out patients in the same period. On to the school, where the classrooms were busy, joyful and happy as class after class welcomed me and competed for my attention as they participated in the learning activities.

There are only four of the children from the Shiv Sadan families still at Raphael and like many of the older ones they will soon be moving on to tertiary training programmes or employment.

I spent some time with the residents of Shiv Sadan, involving a couple of invitations into individual homes and a very moving encounter with a tearful Dwan, holding a treasured photo of my family, a small taste of the difference we all make. A quick detour and a climb to the rooftop of the main classroom block to see the huge new solar array funded by some of the generous Singleton donation (as shown below)



Now to the staffing and Governance arrangements.

Brigadier Arun Bhatnagar (Retd) is retiring as CEO and the board have selected Mr Sanjai Kapil as his replacement. Raphael will remain in very good hands with Sanjai. Arun will be missed but the two of them are working through the transition in a very thorough and highly professional way. Equally Air Marshall B.D. Jayal has stepped down as Chairman of the Governing Council after 14 years of selfless quality service. General Rostun K. Nanavatty has been elected to the role. Rostun is an inspiration and along with his wife Sanuti will offer great ongoing leadership to Raphael.

As a result of my in-depth discussions with the Raphael management team and with the assistance of our Overseas Volunteers' Co-ordinator, Susie MacKerras, I will make a detailed presentation to the Board in November.

We expect Raphael to be well represented at our Biennial Conference at Ivanhoe next April.

Helping children at Raphael Volunteer Ben, Physiotherapist

Going to Raphael was an easy decision due to the endless praise it receives from anyone who is lucky enough to visit.

As a physiotherapist I had been working in a hospital setting for two years and Raphael was the perfect opportunity to help grow my skills, as well to use what I had learned to help out those who do not have such an abundant supply of health resources.

I arrived in Raphael late at night after a long journey from Delhi. Expecting to just pick up some keys and fall into bed. Instead found the cook had been waiting up for me, going from his house to check when I arrived, so he could make sure I got dinner. This was the first example of a selfless desire to help which became a common trait in everyone I met working at Raphael. This gives reason to why I believe Raphael is so successful in making such positive progress in each one of its kids.

My arrival was at a perfect time. One of the physiotherapists had recently left and even though Megha, the head physiotherapist, was doing a fantastic job running the ship solo, the amount of work that could be done was endless. My work at Raphael primarily involved doing daily physio sessions and making treatment plans for the physically disabled kids in the school. With most of the kids having a Cerebral Palsy presentation, our work focused on increasing their independence with activities of daily living, thus enabling them to participate more with their family, friends and within the community. **Although my "physio Hindi" wasn't as fluent as would be ideal, the amount you can do for these kids is amazing and to see the amount Megha and the teachers have already done for them is mind boggling.**

In the short 3 months I was there the progress I was able to see was fantastic, and the kids, although challenging, were incredible fun to work with and you could ultimately see the added quality of life these kids were receiving from Raphael.

I was also lucky enough to be the physio to go on the community based rehab programme. This was one of the highlights of my time in India. Stretching out to the rural suburbs of Dehradun you get a whole new appreciation



of Indian communities. We were welcomed in to numerous homes to assess and make early intervention plans for their young children. The appreciation from the families really helps you to understand how valuable this is to them who mostly, up till now, had received little information on how to cope with a disabled child.

As much as you are able to help out during your time there, Raphael also gives you a whole new set of skills and growth that you did not realise you needed until you got there. As a physio my job varied from looking after early intervention kids, school age kids, the elderly residents of Shiv Sadan **with cured leprosy, and of course, learning to dance for Founders' Day.** As a volunteer in India I was able to make lifelong friendships, see amazing sights including weekend treks through the close by Himalayas, getaways to nearby towns of Rishikesh and Chandigarh and not so nearby places like Amritsar, Dharamsala, Jaipur and Chopta.

A great experience and I will probably look at returning in the future.

In August 2017, Peter and Helen Newton visited Klibur Domin for two weeks. It was Peter's eighteenth visit and Helen's fourth. Neither had travelled to other than the capital Dili, Tibar village (where Klibur Domin is located) and a few other remote villages to observe Klibur Domin's outreach programs. The rest of Timor-Leste was a closed book to us.

On this visit, the Home Manager, Joaquim Soares and his wife Maria decided to take a week's leave and drive us 855 km around their beautiful country, much of which Maria had not seen, and there were even a few of the places we visited which were new to Joaquim. It was a voyage of discovery for Helen and me and opened our eyes to the delightful Timorese people, the extreme poverty in the remote villages, the great natural beauty and the tourist potential of the country. However, much is needed to improve the roads and communications and to provide suitable accommodation and restaurants before a tourist boom could occur.

Our first week was spent at Klibur Domin where we were impressed with the tremendous progress made since our last visits. Ryder-Cheshire and Rotary have contributed hundreds of thousands of dollars over the past five years to undertake essential improvements and maintenance work which has significantly improved the facilities at the home and its operation.

In the same period, Klibur Domin has acquired a grant of A\$400,000 from the Global Fund to set up a second Mobile TB Team to detect and treat TB and to educate village people on how to avoid contracting this potentially fatal disease. With nearly one percent of the Timorese population having TB, Timor-Leste has the highest incidence of the disease in Asia and among the highest in the world.

To serve the transport needs of this second Mobile Team, a new Toyota 4WD vehicle has been purchased with funding from the Rotary Club of Ballina, together with matching Rotary District and International grants. Ryder-Cheshire has worked closely with Rotary in the 17 years

since Klibur Domin was established and many of the improvements over the years have been funded by Rotary.

Two years ago, one of the inpatient wards for TB patients at Klibur Domin was found to have serious structural faults due to shoddy workmanship by the original

Indonesian contractors in the 1990s. The ward had to be demolished and a new ward constructed. This work is nearly complete, and shortly Klibur Domin will be able to accommodate 22 additional TB patients in a purpose built facility with every bedroom having an ensuite bathroom.

Recent statistics have revealed that Multi-Drug Resistant-TB (MDR-TB) is on the increase. Klibur Domin has the only facility in Timor-Leste for the long term treatment of MDR-TB, so it is an essential player in combatting this most serious strain of TB. MDR-TB patients often spend eight months in the isolation ward at Klibur Domin before the disease is cured. Sometimes they have not survived. With money generously donated by Ryder-Cheshire Canterbury in New Zealand, Klibur Domin is now constructing a second isolation ward for MDR-TB patients.

The Medical Clinic at Klibur Domin had been inadequate for many years and needed to be expanded. With funding from Ryder-Cheshire Australia, the size of the Clinic was doubled and, at the same time, a Dental Surgery was added.

In July this year, Klibur Domin introduced a trial Dental Care Program with two retired dentists from South Australia (Ian Ridley and John Denton, both of whom are Rotarians) treating more than 100 patients in a two week visit. Some technical problems arose with the dental chair and these will be fixed by another Rotarian, Brian Summers, who will travel from Melbourne to Klibur Domin later this year. Once the Dental Surgery is fully operable, the plan is to seek volunteer dentists to travel to Klibur Domin for two or three week periods to treat thousands of Timorese villagers, virtually all of whom have never seen a dentist.

We were delighted to see another Rotary funded project completed which had ensured the power and water

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supply to Klibur Domin. A second water bore and new pumps, piping and tanks means that Klibur Domin now has an assured water supply. And a new generator and an improved electrical reticulation system have significantly improved the notoriously unreliable power supply for the home. Rotary Clubs in Mount Gambier, together with matching District and International grants funded these major improvements.

The winding up of the Ryder-Cheshire Home in Singleton allowed \$130,000 to go to Klibur Domin and will fund major repairs to Ward Two (already completed), major **extensions and renovations to the Volunteers' Cottage** (nearly completed), the purchase of a new 4WD ambulance (presently being negotiated) and the resurfacing of all the roads in the complex (to be completed when all the other major building projects are finalised). Once this is done, the intention is to seek a volunteer horticulturist from Australia to go to Klibur Domin for several years to design, implement and maintain a landscape plan, including new trees, shrubs and grassed areas. The aim is to make Klibur Domin as relaxed and peaceful as possible to aid the recovery of the patients.

The recruitment of Fabiola dos Santos to be the General Manager, working under Joaquim Soares, has made a big difference to the management of Klibur Domin, with Fabiola handling day to day matters and Joaquim concentrating on strategic matters, programs and projects. This year we have been fortunate to have had some excellent volunteers, including four teams of Rotarians who have each contributed enormously to Klibur Domin. We thank them all for their tremendous support.

**“Klibur Domin - memorable
and humbling”** *by Pei San*

The seven weeks that I spent in Klibur Domin, was nothing short of memorable and humbling. Prior to the commencement of my volunteering period, Ryder Cheshire Australia liaised with Klibur Domin and drafted some tasks which I could possibly assist with, based on my work experiences. I also had the opportunity to speak to a recently returned volunteer, to understand better the environment and hear about his experiences. These helped me to have a better idea of what to expect and prepare myself mentally.

Whilst at Klibur Domin, I spent most of my time helping out in administrative tasks including drafting of finance reports, reviewing policies and editing documents written in English. With my academic background in psychology and some research, I gave a brief presentation on the mental health landscape in Timor Leste, and basic information about a few mental illnesses, which some of the residents in Uma Barbara are suffering from, to a group of nursing students who were doing their practicum and some staff at Klibur Domin. I particularly enjoyed my time out of the office interacting with the residents of Uma Barbara, guiding them in doing simple craft activities, drawing, blowing bubbles, or just simply chatting with them.

Although I was mostly involved in administrative tasks, I **learn much about Klibur Domin's work from the staff** in the Community Based Rehabilitation and Tuberculosis teams which head out to the communities regularly for advocacy work and to identify people in need of medical attention. It was always heart warming to hear about and see how the conditions of certain individuals, especially the children, improve after undergoing physiotherapy in Klibur Domin and return home to reunite with their families.

It was easy to settle in at KD as its staff were all very friendly. They were always more than willing to share their experiences, which left me feeling very inspired. They were encouraging whenever I attempted to converse with them in Tetun. It was sad to bid farewell at the end of my short seven weeks. I am thankful to Ryder Cheshire Australia and Klibur-Domin for the opportunity to volunteer with them, giving me not only a memorable and inspiring experience, but also several new friends whom I would very much like to meet again.



When The Mount Gambier Home Board received the disappointing news last year that their bid for **“National Stronger Regions Fund” funding had failed**, the Board was determined that if there was a next time we would put in a better bid.

Subsequently, the Member for Barker, Mr Tony Pasin, advised us of a new Building Better Regions Fund (BBRF) that became available in early 2017.

In order to improve our chances, we commissioned architect Stephen Herbert to redraw the concept plan to include some suggested improvements and to get the build costed by an independent cost consultant Mr Chris Sale. This was done so that we would be able to say we were **“shovel ready” and we would be able to sign a contract** with the Government within 90 days if we were advised that we were successful. Subsequently, the plan for the second Ryder-Cheshire Mt Gambier Home was completed and the Board submitted an application for Building Better Regions Funding in late February.

In July 2017, we were advised our application for a Federal Grant for the second Ryder-Cheshire Mt Gambier Home has been successful. Tony Pasin MP, our local member, announced the Grant when he visited the home on 31st July 2017.

Over the last two months since then we have been finalising building plans, which we had to have ready regardless, as the terms of receiving a grant require us to commence the project within 90 days. Once tenders are finalised we expect to begin construction before the end of the year and would hope to open the second home by September 2018.

The budget for the new home is \$1.1m of which the Federal Grant is \$530,000. The balance is being financed by significant donations, our cash reserves and a bank loan.

The grant from Ryder Cheshire Australia of \$100,000 is greatly appreciated and again I thank the Ryder-Cheshire Board for their support of our project. Similarly the donation of \$100,000 from the sale of the Ryder-Cheshire Singleton home was a major contribution to our budget as is the RCF (SA) donation of \$50,000. The Rotary Club of Mount Gambier West has generously donated \$20,000. We also received over \$13,000 from the profits of a Red Cross, Soroptimists, Lions and Ryder-Cheshire SA catering event for a Rotary District Conference held in Mount Gambier. The budget has also been greatly assisted by several significant private donations.

This second home will make a significant difference to the lives of another five young disabled members of our community. It will also greatly enhance and further the image of Ryder-Cheshire both locally and on the wider front.

THE FIRST MOUNT GAMBIER HOME

Officially opened in Mount Gambier, in April 2006, the home is the permanent home base for five women adults with disabilities. These residents have ongoing support from support workers, and participate during the week in a range of vocational and recreational activities in the community.

The home has been purpose designed and built for its occupants. The home is a little unconventional in that it provides studio style living accommodation, basically a cluster of en suites, to women greater than age 18 who have diverse disabilities. The objective is to provide a level of independence within a 24 hours per day care structure.

The opening of the first house was the fruition of many years work by the Ryder-Cheshire Mt Gambier Home Board, the Mount Gambier Ryder-Cheshire Support Group, and the local community. Funding came from a number of sources, principally Ryder-Cheshire Australia, together with funding from Ryder-Cheshire Foundation (SA), the Federal Government Regional Partnerships program and a bank loan which was fully paid off in June 2010. Land for the home was donated by the City Council of Mount Gambier.

Eleven years on, the operation of the home has largely met the hopes and expectations of the Board and the home has been used as a model in various discussions with other carer organisations.



On February 1st 2017 the Home was honoured by a visit from the State Governor, His Excellency the Honourable Hieu Van Le AC and Mrs Lan Le visited the home. It was a very good visit and Mrs Le offered to host a visit to Government House for the residents.

Fr Vincent Paul Coleman, SJ, OAM

On Thursday 5th October 2017, Fr Paul was laid to rest beside his brother Fr Gerald at Macquarie Park Cemetery, Sydney.



The Coleman Family was well known to Ryder Cheshire through the involvement of his sister Barbara Lewis and brother Peter. Being numbered among the pioneers, they had all enjoyed the privilege of meeting with our founders Leonard and Sue. They took inspiration from their lives and words.

Fr Paul entered the Jesuit Order in 1948 and was ordained a priest in 1959. Over his many years of service he worked in Victoria, South Australia and New South Wales, but it was during his time in Sydney, particularly after Barbara and her husband Patrick moved there from Adelaide, that he became involved in the work of the Ryder Cheshire Foundation. It was Fr Paul who pushed the committee to arrange fund-raising dinners as a two yearly event. Several of these were held at the Mary McKillop Centre where Fr Paul was the chaplain. Others were held at Riverview College. One memorable event was the Dinner at the Opera House, catered for by Guillaume Brahimi. It was a wonderful lunch, Indian food, little children dressed in costumes, speeches and so forth. **Fr Paul's feeling was that one had to encourage wealthy donors and this was a way to accomplish this.**

While Fr Paul continued his work as a dedicated parish priest, he also continued his interest in Ryder Cheshire. His delightful exchanges with Barbara, who was President of the NSW Foundation, during the dinner planning meetings, were enjoyed immensely by the other committee members. Fr Paul also celebrated the memorial prayer service for Leonard Cheshire at St Mary's North Sydney on 31st August 1992.

In 2001 Fr Paul led a small group including Barbara and Patrick Lewis, Maggie Hetheron, Sr Clare and Judy Purdon, to visit Raphael. This was especially poignant as it had been almost thirty years since Barbara had been to Dehradun.

With the passing of Fr Paul we farewell a much loved and devoted family that has contributed significantly towards the relief of suffering in our world. Barbara began working for Leonard in 1961, and she was the one to inspire Fr Paul and Peter to become active members.

We are saddened at their passing.
