

A WEDDING AT RAPHAEL

Ballarat City Councillor Geoff Howard, and Alison Smith had an eventful five-week holiday in India. Geoff proposed to Alison on New Year's Eve while in the South of India and Alison thought "it was the best thing he had ever done". Four days after arriving for their visit to Raphael, the Howards were married on 22nd January 1997 in the Christian Chapel during a simple wedding ceremony officiated by the major-general and chairperson of Raphael.

Supporters of Raphael through the Ballarat Support Group, Geoff, in his words:

"The impulse to propose and have an Indian wedding came on New Year's Eve and I believed the ideal site would be Raphael.......Major General Bakhshi quickly saw to arrangements while the hospital matron advised that she would be my mother and Alison's mother-in-law and would see to our dress, flowers and decoration of the Raphael Chapel.

"On our wedding day it was sunny and the skies were clear, according spectacular views of the snow-covered Himalayas to the north. While I collected rings at the jewellers, Matron dressed Alison in a traditional sari of maroon and gold. Jewellery including ankle bracelets and toe rings, but not the customary nose ring, were added. Alison's finger and toe nails were painted and the standard Indian spot (bindi) was placed on her forehead. I was loaned a modern Indian suit of copious volume and when we were dressed we were garlanded with chains of golden marigolds.

"The staff and overseas volunteers of Raphael attended the brief ceremony where we exchanged our vows and rings. At the conclusion we shared a feast of curries washed down with Indian beer. Afterwards we set off on a deluxe video coach and were entertained by noisy, melodramatic Hindi movies as we returned to New Delhi. This was, as we had expected, a very special day to remember. The only disappointment was that we couldn't share the occasion with family and friends in Australia."

This was overcome when Geoff and Alison celebrated their Australian marriage on Sunday March 9th in the Lydiard Street Uniting Church, Ballarat.

IN BRIEF - From Director 4 January 1997

We celebrated Christmas in our usual way with joy, excitement and sanctity. The highlight as always was the enactment of the nativity scenes by the Little White House and Ava Vihar children. In the evening we had a lovely dinner with the volunteers.

On 3rd December, World Disabled Day, we had a small function in which children from other handicapped schools participated with Ava Vihar and RADC handicapped children. We organised races and an on-the-spot painting competition. It is amazing how much talent they displayed.

The Ava Vihar children were also taken for an outing to a park a few kms away from Raphael. They had a picnic there and enjoyed themselves immensely.

15 February 1997

We are all fine at Raphael. We are getting regular flow of volunteers from Australia for these days. Michelle Cochrane will be with us for two months May-June, she is from Adelaide.

With the cold conditions now subsiding and spring in the air, Raphael bears the freshness and blossoms that makes the vast campus proud of the work achieved and planned. General's impressive tour of New Zealand and Australia in 1996 has widened the ever-growing network of friends, well wishers and supporters of Raphael.

Everyone is aware of the various occasions that provide the founding structure for the Raphael calendar, no sooner has one event passed then preparation for the next is under way. Of the many tea-time celebrations, the most memorable were the 54th wedding anniversary of General & Mrs. Bakhshi on 25th January and Mrs. Bakhshi's birthday on 9th February.

The Ava Vihar residents are following a very programmed schedule cleverly drawn up by Mrs. Priyo Lall and her team. The residents are being trained in various

vocational skills and their products seek a market during Diwali, Christmas and Founders' Day. The volunteers' deep involvement with the residents has led to the success of these programmes.

Naveen, a young moderately retarded boy, has been recently admitted to Ava Vihar and has assimilated to the routine. Gauri Sabherwal, the Psychologist, has been awarded her Ph.D degree. The residents have been in good health and spirits.

Gauri Sabherwal and Jill Stewart are holding the fort in the Liaison Office while Mrs. Sandhya Mazumdar visits her children abroad.

Raphael is also doing restoration work. The water pipeline is being relaid on the campus to meet the needs of the various units. Two new classrooms for Nursery and KG class have been added to the existing structure of the Primary School. The Rispana submersible bridge is undergoing repairs by the local administration, thereby reducing the inconvenience to the public.

We continue to have a flow of dedicated volunteers.

It is a nice feeling to see children growing up fast in the Little White House and in the Day Centre. We wish them all the best in the coming years and pray for their bright future.

6 March 1997

We started the New Year with our regular tea with the staff. 26 January also saw us again assembled in front of LWH for the unfurling of the National Flag for our Republic Day. Our talented children of LWH, Primary School and residents of Ava Vihar put up a small entertainment programme which was concluded by Inder Singh's poem (new resident of Shiv Sadan).

A new 10 year old boy has been admitted to Ava Vihar. He is in the category of a slow learner and can be educated and also trained in some vocational skills. We now have 57 residents including 4 day residents in Ava Vihar.

Day Centre is very active. Their strength has gone up to 70. The daily attendance is approximately 70%. They are still in the Doon School premises.

The Primary School has two more classrooms and an enclosed park-cum-playground for the children at the back of the school, so the children will not be sitting on the verandah, in the heat, rains and cold of the various seasons. The swings were donated by Sue Ann Bruhn of the Australian Ballarat Group.

During the last few months we have had a continuous stream of excellent volunteers, very dedicated in the care of residents, full of life and they adjusted well to the new environment. It makes working together a pleasure. The General is fine and so are all at Raphael. Moeena has gone to Bombay for a holiday and will be back at end of March.

April 1997

Thanks to the last Principal of Ava Vihar, Ashok Ramesh, who left Raphael for further study in *Special Education for MR*, has managed to get Raphael put on the Internet. In this his younger brother who works in the computer field in the U.S.A. has been of great help. There are some mistakes and omissions so in my next letter to Ashok I will point these out so he can update the information at a convenient time.

22 April 1997

This year winter in Dehra Dun has really lingered on and April has been a very pleasant month with spells of chilly weather.

Holi our festival of colours which heralds the coming of summer was on 24th March and it was rather cold. That however, didn't dampen the enthusiasm, of the residents, staff and volunteers and the festival was celebrated with much gaiety and fun. Our Chairman joined us and by the end of the day everyone was just unrecognisable, of course a good

scrub took care of that and everyone was back to normal.

April started with a bang. Amidst feverish preparations for our Founders' Day function, we celebrated our Chairman's birthday on April 1st. Tea time we had the same small cake which is cut for all the birthdays.

On the same day we got confirmation of Lady Ryder visit to Raphael. We were all delighted that she was going to be present for the Founders' Day function. The Chairman drove to Delhi on the morning of 3rd April to meet Lady Ryder at the airport at 10.30 p.m., and they drove all night to be in Raphael early on the morning of the 4th, in time to receive our chief guests, the High Commissioner of Australia to India, His Excellency Mr. Darren Gribble and his charming wife. They lunched with some of the staff and volunteers, who were able to introduce

themselves and get to know Lady Ryder.

Founders' Day on 5th April was bright and sunny. Lady Ryder had a special Mass conducted in the Chapel. Rains-unusual for this time of the year-dampened spirits for a while, but we quickly shifted the venue from the Ava Vihar grounds to the Ava Vihar hall, and residents, guests, staff, volunteers, Lady Ryder and our two esteemed guests piled into the hall, and in spite of the tight squeeze, enjoyed the programme organised by residents, LWH children, Primary School and RADC. The stalls of handicrafts made by Ava Vihar and RADC children did brisk business.

Lady Ryder's stay at Raphael has been very good for all of us. Her constant prayers and blessings for us all, her visits to Ava Vihar, LWH, TB Hospital, Shiv Sadan and TB team, RADC, and Primary School, gave us new ideas for improvement and maintenance. I thanked her for her personal interest in the comfort and care of residents and in guiding us in our work. I got a lot of inspiration working besides her, as she has this marvelous amount of energy and zest for work. She looked her usual energetic self and stood till the train left when I saw her off at the station on the evening of the 14th April.

On the 17th, Patsy [Wright-Warren] arrived for her annual visit and she too visited all the areas of Raphael and went out with the TB team. It is always a great pleasure to have Patsy visiting us. She is familiar with staff and residents and understands our problems. Being a regular visitor she has a very good rapport with all. She leaves us today 22nd April.

The Foundation has continued to be active:

Donation: A generous gift of \$10,000 from Kath Solomon was sent to Raphael to replace old water pipes.

A donation of \$1000 was received from the Singleton Home.

\$5000 was also sent to Raphael as the normal maintenance contribution.

Fundraising: As with other organisations, overall fundraising in NSW has been less over the last 12 months, with adoptions, membership and income from cards being down. It is hoped to hold a street sall in Lane Cove in the near future.

Constitution: The Articles of Association of the Foundation are being finalised in order to make these comply with the NSW Corporation Law.

The Singleton Home has had a change of caretakers, our Colombian family having moved to Queensland, sadly for us. However, we now have Ruth and Eduardo Chavez from Peru, who are keeping the home beautifully according to the standard set by Beatriz, despite the havoc created by a cricket-ball sized hailstorm the week before their departure. Skylight, windows, gauze screens, lights and fans had to be replaced, to say nothing of mopping up and cleaning of carpets, etc. The house and garage roof have yet to be replaced, and one back wall. Jim remains our permanent resident, now needing a little more care as his muscular dystrophy is progressing. He is very content and finds life with the Chavez's very interesting.

The Singleton committee have 'adopted' Bachan Singh (Leprosy Colony).



AGNES McLEAN and the BALLARAT SUPPORT GROUP OF THE RYDER-CHESHIRE FOUNDATION

Since 1964, the people of Ballarat have provided strong support for Raphael. This most successful support group began through almost a web of coincidences and at its centre a lady who is now in her 91st year, *Agnes McLean*.

In 1925, Agnes, with her family, moved from her birthplace, Minyip, to Ballarat. Soon after, she began her training in Melbourne as a nurse. Before returning to Ballarat in 1946, Agnes had a position as Matron at Xavier College. One of her charges was the brother of **Barbara Coleman** (now Lewis). Another boy was the brother of **Josephine Collins**. The two boys went to India to train as Jesuit priests.

Barbara and Josephine went to visit their brothers. Neither of the girls could forget the poverty and suffering that they encountered. In 1961, Barbara met Leonard Cheshire and became very aware of his dedication to care for the helpless. Barbara offered her organizational skills to aid Leonard's work. She was appointed the Liaison Officer and Co-ordinator for the Cheshire Homes in India.

In 1953, Agnes became the foundation president of the Ballarat branch of the Catholic Nurses' Guild. In 1963, Barbara Coleman was the guest speaker at a meeting of the Guild and possibly for the first time in Ballarat, the work of Leonard Cheshire was described and the tale told of the founding of Raphael. The seeds were sown for the beginning of a close assocation between the Catholic Nurses' Guild and what was to be the Ballarat Support Group.

In 1964, Group Captain Leonard Cheshire was to visit Australia for a second time. His first visit with his wife, Sue Ryder, had resulted in a steady stream of volunteers to Raphael, but not a strong financial commitment. For this second visit, Barbara Coleman and Josephine Collins hoped for a stronger financial support.

Because the girls knew Agnes, they contacted her to see if a visit to Ballarat could be arranged. It was in Agnes McLean's home that the first steps were taken to plan the visit of Leonard Cheshire to Ballarat. From this initial meeting, other meetings were arranged with prominent

Ballarat people. Finally, arrangements were made for a public meeting to be held at the Civic Hall. On May 5th, 1964, over 1000 people attended. The Ballarat Support Group was founded on June 25th, 1964.

Agnes was a foundation member of the committee led by the foundation president John (Spot) Hurly. The idea of "adopting" residents at Raphael was spreading throughout support groups and Agnes encouraged members of the Catholic Nurses' Guild to commit financial support to Raphael through adoptions. Agnes, with her sister Mary, led the way by jointly sponsoring a resident.

Agnes has never faltered in her support of Raphael. This support has been strengthened by reports from volunteers when they returned to Raphael, and who was not touched by the work of Anne Young, the Mountain Nurse.

Agnes always wrote to those sponsored by Mary and herself and so by the very act of writing, strengthened the links between herself and Raphael. Agnes has acted as hostess and chauffeur to Leonard and Sue when they have visited Ballarat. When overseas Agnes made visits to Cheshire Homes.

Over the years, helped by her late sister, Mary, Agnes has held card parties which raised valuable dollars for Raphael. With the support of other committee members, Agnes has collected clothing for Residents at Raphael and exhorted her friends to support the various functions organised to raise money. If there is a cake to cut to celebrate some special occasion for the Support Group, it is usually Agnes who is asked to 'cut the cake'.

It was so well deserved when in 1979, Agnes was presented with an Honorary Life Membership of the Ballarat Support Group. Even at 90 years of age and with a partially amputated leg, Agnes continues her interest in and support of Raphael.

THE ROSA LEONARD CHESHIRE

The Ryder-Cheshire Foundation in Australia has initiated a project to commemorate Group Captain Lord Cheshire of Woodhall, VC, OM, DSO, DFC, -- Leonard Cheshire - who in partnership with his wife Sue Ryder -Lady Ryder of Warsaw, CMG, OBE, - in 1959 started the Ryder-Cheshire Mission for the Relief of Suffering and the founding of the RAPHAEL settlement in Dehra Dun, Northern India.

The Rosa Leonard Cheshire will be nationally launched by our National 🗗 Patron His Excellency, The Hon. Sir William Deane, AC, KBE, Governor General of the Commonwealth of Australia, in Canberra on Anzac Day **1998**.

The rose will be ready for ordering from late 1997 for planting in the winter/spring of 1998. A painting of the rose will be produced as a Ryder-Cheshire Card.
