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# Report on The Australian Association of Ryder-Cheshire Foundations From The Honourable Mr. Justice Nagle

The third meeting of the Australian Association of Ryder-Cheshire Foundations was held in Sydney on Sunday, 13th October, 1974, and we were fortunate in having present the two Founders, Group Captain and Mrs. Cheshire. All of the Foundations were represented with the exception of the Western Australian Foundation which sent its apologies. In addition, Mr. John Baker was present representing the New Zealand Foundations and Mr. J. Dacey came from Queensland.

Now that Australia and New Zealand have taken over the full responsibility for "Raphael" from the United Kingdom Foundation, it was vital that the Foundations should discuss in detail plans to run and finance "Raphael".





It became obvious that our responsibilities, with which it had appeared originally we could cope quite easily, have as a result of changing circumstances presented us with much greater problems than we had originally envisaged. Firstly due to the rising costs brought about by inflation and, secondly difficulties of communication due to the absence of any Australian representative at "Raphael". It was indeed fortunate that the Founders were present at the meeting and that New Zealand and all the other Foundations, with the exception of Western Australia, were represented. All present viewed our immediate troubles as difficulties that could and must be surmounted.

The question of monies for the erection of a Causeway Bridge over the Rispana River was discussed in detail, and Group Captain Cheshire was able to explain this project and its necessity as he had visited "Raphael" on the way out to Australia. The Foundations represented decided that this project must go ahead, and the various representatives suggested possible contributions that could be expected from their Foundations.

It is hoped that in due course the decisions of the meeting will be implemented and that these will be of advantage to "Raphael". In addition, I think one should emphasise the great value of the meetings of the Australian Association where we can exchange views and perhaps from mutual support gain a greater feeling of confidence in our efforts. This was especially the case at this particular meeting when we were fortunate in having Group Captain and Mrs. Cheshire with us.

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### Ryder-Cheshire Homes in Australia ?

Group Captain Cheshire and Sue Ryder expressed great enthusiasm and interest in the establishment of Ryder-Cheshire Homes in Australia during their recent visit. They believe that there are certain gaps in the provision of facilities for the chronically sick by established Government and private institutions. They would like to see our Foundations making an effort to fill these gaps. Their primary aim is still to assist in the personal development of medically stabilized but permanently sick members of our community for whom there are no particular facilities available. The Ryder-Cheshire Home should be one which will, as much as possible, replace the security which a patient may have lost by being forced to move out of a family environment and, at the same time, still allow him to develop useful skills so that he will have a greater purpose in life.

The Cheshires realise that building costs in Australia have risen dramatically but, with Governments offering large percentages of the total expenses it is still quite feasible to raise sufficient money. They believe that building should follow the basic simplicity which most of their Homes have. Often small beginnings create and develop wide-spread local interest which leads to increased support and further expansion at a future date. It is essential to build with room for expansion. In this way primary financial targets need not be large and when the initial structure can be seen more local enthusiasm is generated.

During their visit the Cheshires discussed the question of establishing local Homes in a number of areas, in particular in Perth, Melbourne, Moe and Ballarat. From their vast experience in such matters they are insistent that such ventures must grow out of local enthusiasm and need. Furthermore, the planning, design and financing must all be done on a local basis with Governing Councils acting only in a supervisory and coordinating capacity but retaining the right of approval of the total scheme.

Our Founders were particularly enthusiastic about the five acre site available to us at a nominal charge at Moe. They believe it to be one of the most attractive situations that they have seen anywhere in the world and are very keen that, if it is at all possible, our local Support Group in the area generate enough interest to establish a strong professionally oriented sub-committee to get the project on the way.

It is believed by the Cheshires that the establishment of Homes in Australia will in no way diminish our primary commitments to "Raphael", in fact, our aims should be better known through the community and they believe that the support for our Indian venture will increase and widen.

The programme for the Saturday included a visit to the Catharine McAuley Home where Sue and Leonard were able to inspect the small section to which the W.A. Foundation is contributing funds and to discuss the operation of the home with its Principal, Sister Martin. Jean and Fred Black then entertained Sue and Leonard to lunch. In the evening an informal dinner for the Cheshires, Archbishop Goody and for members of the W.A. Council was held at the delightful home of Mr. & Mrs. N. Tucker at City Beach.

During the remainder of their stay Sue Ryder addressed the Presbyterian congregation at Floreat Park, the Catholic congregation Clarement parish church, and pupils of St. Hilda's School, Loreto Nedlands, St. Louis and Swanbourne High Schools. Leonard Cheshire addressed the boys of Guildford Grammar School and of the Servite College, Tuart Hill. Space does not permit full details of each meeting. However it is estimated that more than 3,000 people of all ages had the privilege of hearing Sue and Leonard speak during their stay and this gives a fair idea of their crowded programme.

The many supporters of the W.A. Foundation were delighted to hear from Leonard of the possibility of a further local involvement by the W.A. Group and we look forward to more news of this exciting project.

All those who heard them speak were moved by Sue and Leonard's quiet charm and were uplifted by their intense dedication to their work for the relief of suffering throughout the world. Their visit was a great inspiration to us all. We wish them a happy and successful visit throughout the rest of Australia and a speedy return to Perth.

Of other matters, we were sorry to learn of the illness of our patron His Excellency the Governor of W.A., Air Commodore Hughie Edwards. We send him our best wishes for a quick and complete recovery. We offer our congratulations to Elaine Paxton who has recently married. Our future programme will include a summer function to be held after the school holidays and full details of this will be made known early in the New Year.
