#### VISIT TO "RAPHAEL" IN JANUARY 1971 (Conclusion)

(The first part of this article was published in the June issue of the Newsletter).

After luncheon with the staff we proceeded to Raphael. As I have said our time unfortunately was limited, but we went to each of the various Homes. We started with the tubercular patients. There is a ward for men and one for women. Some of the patients are elderly and in some cases their lungs are so badly affected that there is no hope of any cure. Some patients are young and with some of them there is every expectation that they will be cured and discharged within a comparatively short time. There were two most attractive young patients, one in the men's ward and one in the women's ward, who were brother and sister, and we were happy to learn that in each case the prognosis was good.

We proceeded from the tubercular patients to visit those suffering from cerebral palsy. Here again in some cases there is likelihood that the patients will be able to lead a useful and near normal life. Two small girls who soon adopted two young men from our party, and were carried around by them displayed bright intelligence, and the staff is happily anticipating that they can be fully educated. From these the patients descend gradually to those who are completely bedridden and incontinent. All patients seem to receive the same loving care and attention. We saw some of the mentally disturbed patients playing and singing "The Farmer in the Dell", and I hope that the film which was taken will show this as well as the other activities which we observed.

The Little White House is a very pleasing part of the institution. Here the small children were engaged in various activities. Our visit occurred just before the return of Miss Pamela Holt who was expected back at Raphael within a short time after our visit. One small boy was being given a very efficient haircut by one of the leprosy patients. This is one of the most pleasing aspects at Raphael, namely that the leprosy patients under proper medical supervision, can lead near normal lives and do all manner of useful things.

The leprosy colony was perhaps the most inspiring because here the lepers live with their families and the atmosphere is one of cheerfulness and contentment. I was particularly pleased to make the acquaintance of my adoptee Shaun Li who is an attractive, cheerful little woman.

As we have seen in the films, Raphael is beautifully situated at the foot of the mountains and with a forest background. I would wish that all the Australian supporters of the Ryder-Cheshire Foundation could have the opportunity of visiting and observing the atmosphere of good cheer and serenity which pervades the centre.

#### FROM THE VICTORIAN CLOTHING OFFICER

I have been notified by Colonel Puri (Administrator at "Raphael") that the clothing storeroom is full, and another twenty chests are yet to arrive. This surplus is due to the fact that for the past year the distribution of clothing to leprosy victims or destitute people living outside "Raphael" has been forbidden. The opening and distribution of our gift is also more strictly supervised by a representative from the District Magistrate's office. A detailed packing list making my task almost impossible has also been requested.

As "Raphael" has ample clothing for the next six months at least, the Clothing Appeal will be closed until a further notice is placed in this paper. In the meantime, the Committee will endeavour to sort our problems out with the Indian Government. The thirty—one packed chests will be divided between the Ryder—Cheshire Foundation Perth, and in Victoria between an association helping deserted wives and their children, and homes coping with real poverty in industrial suburbs.

We hope that the many people who have so kindly made or given clothing specifically for the appeal will understand the difficulties of the present situation which makes the Council's decision of redistribution the most practicable solution.

I would urge all "Raphael's" loyal Clothing Appeal workers to keep on accepting gifts for families in need, and to continue knitting those lovely rugs, jumpers and caps, but to distribute them with care locally, maintaining the Ryder—Cheshire standard and spirit of love, without which such gifts are useless.

#### VICTORIAN FOUNDATION

The Annual Meeting was held on 6th July, and the attendance to hear the Hon. Justice Roma Mitchell as Guest Speaker, and to see the Four Corners film "Cheshire Story" was most gratifying. The meeting welcomed the following new members to the Foundation Council: Mr. P. BRADFIELD, Dr. W.M. CALANCHINI, Mr. G. DETHRIDGE, Miss S. FREDERICO, Miss B. KEANE and Mr. B. MORLEY.

Miss Bernadette Keane is already well known as the Victorian Adoptions Secretary. Miss Frederico and Mr. Dethridge both accompanied Justice Roma Mitchell on her visit to "Raphael" which is reported elsewhere in this issue of the Newsletter.

#### Highlights from the Annual Report:

This was a year of greatly increased activity saddened only by the loss of our Foundation President Sir Arthur Dean who died shortly after retiring from office. Sir Arthur had always been actively associated with our work, and he was looking forward to renewing acquaintance with Group Captain and Mrs. Cheshire on the occasion of their visit, but unfortunately he was unable to do so. His loss is keenly felt. In his memory a bed in the TB Unit at "RAPHAEL" has been endowed thanks to a generous donation by his family.

The highlight of the past year was undoubtedly the visit of Group Captain Cheshire and his wife, better known under her maiden name of Sue Ryder. They devoted themselves unsparingly to a crowded programme of meetings, receptions, and press, radio and television interviews, not only throughout Australia, but also in New Zealand. The coverage afforded by all media was extensive and most favourable, and our special thanks are due to Mrs. H.P. Brown whose excellent liaison with the press and radio made this possible, to Mr. John Parker who organized the Public Meeting, and particularly to the Combined Service Clubs, Melbourne Lions Club and Mr. Arthur Stark for the very successful function at the Arts Centre.

The visit was the means of bringing our members together and increasing interest in our work, so that many new members were gained. The Group Captain and his wife are such popular figures that wherever they went friends and admirers waited patiently for a chance to speak to them personally. With the long distances travelled, the tour was very strenuous and tiring, and although everything possible to avoid exhausting our visitors was attempted, I am afraid that at times the limits of endurance were almost reached. Now that our family in Australia has grown further with a new Foundation in the West and new support groups have been formed elsewhere, on future visits it will become necessary to limit the itinerary in order to spare our Founders. The alternative would be to increase the time of the visit, but this may not be practicable as a lengthy absence from important commitments in England and elsewhere is not desirable.

In Victoria, a new Support Group was formed during the year at Sale, and to avoid confusion with the other Group in the area, the older Group is now known as West Gippsland and the new Group, East Gippsland. This Group distinguished itself by raising \$250 in its first few months of operation. The Support Groups are now Melbourne, Pentridge, Rispana, Templestowe, Ballarat, West Gippsland, East Gippsland and Goulburn Valley.

In conclusion, might I thank all members of the Council and the Support Groups for their active support. We may look forward confidently to meeting our commitments to "RAPHAEL" and even accepting responsibility for particular projects in addition to monthly maintenance. After all, the purpose of raising funds is

to ensure that they are spent to the best advantage in Dehra Dun for the relief of suffering, and the advancement of the welfare of our charges, so that whenever we have funds in hand, the Council seeks ways to put them to the best possible use. I am happy to be able to report that no person receives any payment or gratuity for work performed in an executive capacity for this Foundation. We have no paid employees of any sort, and I must say that it still comes as a welcome surprise to me to find so many wonderful people prepared to give so freely of their time and services, seeking no reward other than the knowledge that they are helping a most worthwhile cause.
