### From TB patient to HR Manager

### Staff profile: Carmen de Carvalho

In 2007 Carmelita de Carvalho was fortunate to receive quick treatment when she suddenly had a coughing fit.

The diagnosis was Tuberculosis, with initial treatment including a visit to hospital.

Within a couple of weeks Carmen became another TB patient at Klibur Domin receiving a daily course of drugs lasting eight months.

Soon after recovering, Carmen became the first person engaged to cook solely for the

Carmen and husband Carlos were provided with one of the original small staff cottages at KD in 2008.

Carmen became KD's receptionist in 2011, before moving into administration, and is currently Manager for HR and Administration.

The mostly dry Tibar Creek separates KD from Carmen's home nearby. She says there are only one to two days per year that there is sufficient water to prevent her from getting to work.

Carmen enjoys working at KD "as it is a place for everyone in the Municipality to get free health treatment."



# A word from Joaquim Manager of Klibur Domin

#### **Dear Donors, Volunteers, Supporters and Friends**

After the somewhat disrupted start to the year, KD and its dedicated staff have continued to exceed targets set by funding organisations, as you will see from the table on Page 6 of this Newsletter.

However, KD's TB activities will be reduced from next year due to the conclusion of the Korean Government sponsored TB project, and a reduction in funding from The Global Fund.

#### **Funding application**

We are currently applying for funding to continue TB testing and treatment in part of the relatively nearby Ermera District. If successful, we will be able to retain at least some of the staff who will otherwise be farewelled.

#### In-patient care grant

In more positive news, KD has been successful in receiving a grant from the Prime Minister's Civil Society Fund for 2023, to extend the level of in-patient care that KD can provide to people with a range of serious health conditions.

Further, KD has just signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Ministry of Health, not only acknowledging the critical role KD plays in Timor's health system, but also cementing ongoing support from the Ministry and its agencies.

#### Volunteers welcome

Finally, a reminder that Klibur Domin would very much like to host more volunteers, both young and older, for short, medium or long-term visits.

### Update on CBR clients at Saint Damien's

# The Community-Based Rehabilitation (CBR) team achieves great things at KD.

One component of the CBR Program is the opportunity for individuals and their families to stay at Saint Damien's Respite Centre for as long as required (several days to several months) to access therapy, rehabilitation, and respite from difficult living conditions.

Food is provided so that family members can focus on the individual requiring intensive support.

Here is a snapshot of clients at Saint Damien's on 17 October 2023:

Ronizia is 19 years old, from Gleno in Ermera district. Ronizia has been diagnosed with severe osteoarthritis in one knee as a result of a bike accident three years ago. Continued on Page 9

### Volunteer report

### Andrew Seabrook and Katrina Hutcheson

KD's Information, Communications and Technology Project received a kick along in July when Andrew Seabrook and Katrina Hutcheson spent three weeks at Klibur Domin.

Here are extracts from Katrina's detailed report:

#### WEEK 1:

'Andrew hit the ground running, working in his usual style of total commitment. He worked through Friday and Saturday, with me alongside as general run about, until we met with the lovely Carmen, HR Administrator of KD at her home for afternoon tea and meeting her family.

'It was great to engage with Joaquim Soares, Managing Director, KD and share a working history in Disability Advocacy and learn about the Timor-Leste Disability Advocacy Association.

'Chatting with the children in the student accommodation, Garton House, and giving them some of the books that were set aside for the school where they're studying has been fun.

'They enjoy engaging with us and practicing their English language skills. I've found that English is well spoken here, however people are often shy or lack the confidence in speaking it. From my own experience when learning a language, this is probably quite commonplace.'

#### WEEK 2:

'The project is winding up, Andrew is relieved that the design has proven itself, and he is satisfied that it is now 90% complete and KD is in a significantly better place than it was for ICT support.

#### No consistency with equipment

'However, the real issue that staff face at KD, is that all their computers are very old with many containing unlicensed software. Staff often run multiple versions of antivirus software, each computer has a different version of Windows, some running Windows 11 on laptops that are many years old, so

they're not really capable of supporting the operating system.

'There is no consistency throughout KD's IT equipment. As a result, it made a simple process of establishing email accounts and mapping the shared drives more complicated and difficult than it needed to be.

'One of the last hurdles we faced was connecting the TB lab to the wireless network (WWAN). By switching the Enterprise Access Point antennas around we were finally able to connect the TB Laboratory to the WWAN, after trying unsuccessfully for many days. Phew! The smiles from Andrew and staff at the TB Lab were significant.

### Volunteer report continued

'Andrew also completed the installation of a video conferencing system in the Director's office over the last couple of days. Andrew gifted a PTZ Camera to the KD Director Joaquim Soares, including a small conference microphone and speaker.

'One of the buildings at Klibur Domin, Garton House, is an accessible home for students who have a disability that attend the Convent School across the road. Andrew took the opportunity to join them in a sing-along with a local song that he learnt on his last visit to Timor-Leste.

'Prior to our travel to Dili, Ann Dalby (Casterton Rotary) assisted with a significant collection of books for boarding school girls at the Convent School. We arranged an extra 20 kg of baggage each through Ryder-Cheshire, which meant we were able to deliver most of them on our visit. The girls were thrilled and absolutely dived into them.'

### Community-Based Rehabilitation Monitoring

### Extract from report by Siobhan Reeves

It was great to travel with the CBR team to Hatolia in Ermera District on 18 October to monitor the outcome of KD's recent support in that area.

It took three hours to reach Hatolia, largely due to very poor road conditions south of Gleno. We saw beautiful views to Ramelau and Kailaku mountains, many Marian shrines, and memorials to resistance fighters.

#### Albaro

On arrival in Hatolia we visited Albaro who is 30, has mobility limitations as a result of Cerebral Palsy and lives semi-independently in a small house behind his mother's home. With funding from the Ministry of Social Support and Inclusion (MSSI), KD has provided a water tank and materials for an accessible bathroom, which Albaro's older brother Anaundo constructed. Anaundo really appreciates the support from KD for his

brother. He noted that during construction of the bathroom and ramp the municipality sent a delegation to observe and they too were proud to have KD's support in this village. Anaundo hopes KD will be able to support other villagers in need. This support is dependent on funding as the CBR program is already stretched. Albaro would like to buy a small plough so that he can use the small plot of land behind his house to grow vegetables to support himself.

At the conclusion of our visit Albaro showed us down a short track beside his house to a lovely small lake called 'Belai' which used to be a tourist attraction. It was a very pleasant spot and hopefully can be rejuvenated as an attraction in the future to help diversify the village's economy.

#### Helio

We next visited Helio, who is 22 and also has mobility limitations associated with Cerebral Palsy. He lives with his parents and would like to build his own small house. With funding from MSSI, KD provided a water tank and materials for an accessible bathroom for Helio. The bathroom is not yet finished, and the KD staff arranged for the additional cement that is required. KD has also previously provided food and mosquito nets for Helio and his family. His parents are very grateful for the support, and spoke positively about how KD interacts with the community.

#### Municipal office

Last stop was the municipality office, where we met the village administrative leader, Luis. Luis had requested support from KD to build a ramp for people with disability to be able to enter the municipality office. A KD staff member stayed overnight in Hatolia to construct the ramp and railing. There are 85 people with disability identified in the village who will benefit from the ramp. Luis was very pleased with the promptness of KD's response.

Many thanks to the CBR team for their ongoing work in supporting people with disabilities in the community, and to MSSI for their ongoing support.

My stay in Uma Newton was very comfortable, with many changes to volunteer accommodation since I first came to Klibur Domin. Volunteers are very fortunate to have access to a consistent water supply, consistent electricity with more reliable generators and treated water in Uma Newton. The lovely cooks continue to provide delicious and nutritious meals for lunch and dinner. (Full report in next Red Feather)

### Uma Garton Ballarat Grammar School Project

### Annexe structure completed

# The Ballarat Grammar School Project at Garton Cottage (Uma Garton) was recently completed at Klibur Domin.

This project was to add an annexe at the back of Uma Garton, a water tank and a fence around the vegetable garden.

This has resulted in better washing facilities for students living at Uma Garton. They can now also regu- larly water the small vegetable garden at the back of the cottage, protected from goats and other ani- mals by the fence.

The space is now pleasant and more private for students to sit in the afternoon or evening.

Uma Garton currently supports nine students attending the Franciscan high school close to Klibur Domin. The students range from 15 to 25 years of age, and have a range of disabilities, including amputations, cerebral palsy and partial blindness.

Two young women who were residents at Uma Garton last year have started university in Dili, which is a wonderful achievement. This project will benefit students residing at Uma Garton for their secondary schooling for many years to come.

She has been at KD for two months and is expected to stay another two months. She undergoes therapy twice a day, and the prognosis is that she should be able to walk unassisted again so that she can return to school. She has been unable to attend school since the accident.

Antoninho (pictured right) is 69 years old, from Same in Manufahi district. He is undergoing rehabilitation after suffering a stroke, and has been at KD for two weeks. The length of his stay is dependent on his progress. He is not here with any family members but they try to visit on the weekends. He undergoes therapy exercises twice a day when able. He is very happy to be at KD and

noted that it is calmer and quieter than in Dili and the facility is good.

Anna-Gloria is 24 years old, and from Quelicai in Baucau district. She was originally a TB patient at KD, and received TB treatment for eight months. The TB team identified that she was also a candidate for the CBR program, as she was unable to walk due to complications from meningitis. She has been residing at Saint Damien's (after her TB treatment ended) for five months, and in that time has gone from bedridden to using a wheelchair, then to a walking frame and now walking unassisted. In addition to regular therapy her mother would ensure she practiced walking around the compound every day. Anna-Gloria is returning home by the end of the week.
